I. PRIESTLY FRATERNITY AND THE APOSTOLATE

- A. When Americans hear the word "fraternity," most likely they think of a college frat house.
 - 1. A place where college guys live, eat and, perhaps most of all, party together.
 - 2. Priestly fraternity can also involve guys living, eating, and partying together, but it is much more than that!
- B. Our priestly fraternity is the consequence of the divine filiation received at Baptism and the sacramental identification with Christ received with Holy Orders.
 - 1. At baptism, we become adopted sons of God.
 - 2. This means that God is our Father, which makes us brothers.
 - 3. At ordination, we are identified with Christ as an *Alter Christus*.
 - 4. Jesus is Our Lord, but He is also our Brother.

C. Implications of brotherhood:

- 1. I am from a family of 7 boys and 2 girls, so I have 6 brothers.
- 2. We lived, ate, prayed, played, and worked together.
- 3. As priests, we often live, eat, pray, play, and work together.
 - a) Feeling responsible for the sanctity—the happiness—of our fellow priests, having at least a few whom we try to get to know especially well.
 - b) Helping them to receive spiritual and doctrinal means of formation,
 - c) Fraternity should include the human warmth of our friendship.
 - d) Helping them to rest, give them supernatural advice, make fraternal correction.
- D. Priests working together: collaboration in the apostolate.
 - 1. We are not lone rangers.
 - 2. Even if assigned as the only priest to a parish or parishes, priests are collaborators first of all with their bishop, a successor of the apostles, and with each other in the mission entrusted to us by Christ.
 - 3. Apostolate with our friends (cf. *In Conversation with God*, vol. 2/80.3.
- E. Since God is our Father and Jesus is our Brother, Mary is our mother. (cf. *Christ is Passing By*, n. 139).
