ects funded with the \$73,943 donated last year include: providing safety equipment to the elderly, baby items and education to women with an unexpected pregnancy, feeding the hungry, and expanding therapy options for women victimized by human trafficking.

DCJH grant helps women who choose life

MARYVILLE — A Beacon of Light (ABL)
Pregnancy Help Center in Maryville has experienced an increase in the number of abortion-vulnerable women they are able to help. Many of these women have chosen life for their babies thanks to the DCJH grant, said Diane Villhard, the center's marketing chair.

The DCJH grant helped fund an online Google

campaign that identifies the center as an option for women facing unplanned pregnancies. This helps women find the center and helps the center to give women support and care they need.

"Funds are also used to renew the *Bright Course* subscription. This course provides incenter and online lessons on pregnancy care, infant care, parenting, relationships, and healthy choices," said Villhard. "Without these resources, ABL would not be able to provide the practical support that keeps the center connected to its clients."

Birthright sees DCJH grant as blessing

QUINCY — The DCJH grant has been a blessing for the people in the Quincy community, said Birthright of Quincy's

co-director Katie Klauser. Birthright clients are typically o women and girls who



are faced with an unplanned or crisis pregnancy, she said. Birthright's goal is to give them any support they need both emotional and material — to find the right life-affirming choice for them-∼ selves and their children.

"Birthright is operated 100 percent by volunteers, donations, and fundraisers," Klauser said. "The DCJH grant enabled us to provide baby items along with other household needs of the mothers, completely free of charge. Support as simple as this encourages a woman to choose life for her baby." 🏶

Community Mission Center puts DCJH grant funds to practical use

PANA — The Community Mission Center has been in operation since 2010 providing clothing, household items, furniture, hygiene items, and school supplies for the less fortunate in Pana and surrounding communities. "We also have programs providing food for children for the weekends, school supplies,



and coats and warm clothing for children and adults in the winter," said Linda Dunseth. board member and grant administrator. Over 3,700

families were served in 2021. "The DCJH funds enabled the center to install new flooring in the shopping area of the store and to construct a wider and much safer stairway to the basement, where we sort and store donated items," said Dunseth. "These improvements provide a safer environment for both our customers and volunteers." 🏚

Crisis Nursery playground renovation funded in part by DCJH

EFFINGHAM COUNTY — Crisis

Nursery of Effingham County's mission is to prevent and protect children from trauma, abuse, and neglect through the provision of a 24/7/365 free emergency childcare program for children birth through 6 years of age.



This year, the nursery is taking on a largescale renovation of their playground, said Meghan Rewers, director. "The Diocesan Campaign

for Justice and Hope (DCJH) graciously gifted funds to cover the purchase of a piece called 'Melody' that will be installed on the new grounds. This is a music piece that looks and sounds like a xylophone," Rewers said. "We hope to begin the playground renovation in spring of 2023. Support like this of the DCJH for our playground project will help our program give children moments, care, and experiences they deserve." \$

Family Camp participants, leaders thankful for DCJH grant money

Each year, the Family Camp is hardly over and the participants are already

asking about the next year of coming together, she said. "We are grate-



ful to Sacred Heart Parish, Effingham, the Diocesan Campaign for Justice and Hope, and the Knights of Columbus who all support this event. This is our 32nd year of Family Camp and we hope to enjoy many more. Blessings to all who allow us this great gift." 🏚

DCJH helps Grounds of Grace expand virtual programs

SPRINGFIELD — Grounds of Grace is grateful for funding received through the DCJH grant, said Dana Pfeiffer, executive director and founder. This grant opens up possibilities of assisting survivors of human trafficking, she noted.

"Through funding from DCJH, Grounds of Grace is now able to offer our extensive programs virtually," said Pfeiffer. "We are able is assist survivors with online therapy and trauma support; and refer local support for medical, dental, housing, etc. Most importantly, we are able to assist survivors who desire to overcome personal challenges one on

one, providing direction and support to personal needs that arise on their journey to recovery." 🏶

HACSM uses DCJH grants for various purposes

HIGHLAND AREA — DC]H grants always make a difference to the Highland Area Christian Service Ministry, said HACSM Executive Director Diane Williams. Past awards have funded children's cooking classes and small kitchen appliances to help families

cook healthier meals. "Also. distribution of box fans in summer and portable heaters in winter are examples of DCJH funds keeping energy bills more man-



ageable for low-income families in our community," she said.

"We look forward to this year's project of purchasing and distributing automotive maintenance supplies such as tire pressure gauges, jumper cables and windshield washer fluid," Williams said. "These are just a few examples of DCJH funds partnering with our agency to give individuals and families tools toward self-sufficiency and independence."

Community assistance ministry establishes food nooks with DCJH grants

QUINCY — Through the use of the DCJH grant funds, the St. Francis Community Assistance Ministry was able to serve the needy and the isolated by establishing "food nooks" in 13 different locations throughout the community, during and after the COVID pandemic, said ministry leader Mary Beth McGee. The nooks are free-standing "mini food and supply pantries," she said.

The funds from DC1H were used to purchase canned fruit, soups, and meats; as well as pastas, cereals, crackers, and food bars. Washcloths, toothpaste and brushes, gloves, and socks were also purchased.

The DCJH funds were critically important in supporting the ministry in two ways, McGee said. "One, we were able to serve a greater number of those in need; and two, we were able to serve them conveniently and anonymously in their neighborhoods, during the pandemic," she said. 🏚

Continuing food vouchers, thanks to DC1H

MATTOON — Funds received from DCJH have allowed The Society of St. Vincent de Paul in Mattoon to continue their food voucher program. After meeting with a client and assessing their need, a pre-printed voucher is completed which contains a dollar amount that they may spend, said volunteer

Shady Raboin.



"The voucher is taken to a local grocery store with which we have partnered. There is never any change given so we encourage our m

clients to spend as much of the voucher as they can," Raboin said. "Receipt of the grant from DCJH is vital to our program, especially as we continue to see grocery prices rising and need increasing."
